# Tip #1

**Andrea:** "Hey, Ashton! Lots of us love to get our hands dirty in the garden, but sometimes, we just don't have the space or time to tend to a large area. What can we do?"

**Ashton:** "Well Andrea, why not try container gardening? You can do it indoors or out, for flowers or veggies, and it doesn't take much space! First, choose pots that have drainage holes so the plants don't sit in water. Be sure to use a saucer under the pot to catch and hold any excess water. And, to help guarantee success, get a really good potting mix that helps to protect against over- and under-watering while supplying some good plant food. # Earth Conscious Radio

**Andrea:** I'm Andrea Ridout with Ashton Ritchie from the Scotts Miracle Gro Company. Hey, Ashton, even the best gardeners have our share of planting failures. Dead plants look like the plot for a scary Halloween movie. What can we do?

**Ashton:** Well Andrea, you can always look like you have a green thumb when it comes to gardening by just following one tip: Don't put the wrong plant in the wrong place at the wrong time of year. Follow local advice as to what grows here in Texas and read the tag. "Full Sun, moderate water" doesn't mean you plant under a shade tree and water a couple times a day. # Tip #3

**Andrea:** I'm Andrea Ridout with Ashton Ritchie from the Scotts Miracle Gro Company. Hey, Ashton, seems like every year there comes a time when it simply doesn't rain. Or when water restrictions limit our use of sprinklers in the yard and garden.

**Ashton:** Well Andrea, One of the most important things you can do to conserve water during dry spells is mulch. Make sure you use 3 to 4 inches of organic mulch to help hold moisture in your soil and to cut down on weeds that can steal water from your good plants. Avoid pruning when plants are stressed by drought. And when you mow your lawn, leave the grass clippings in place. 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## Tip #4

**Andrea:** I'm Andrea Ridout with Ashton Ritchie from the Scotts Miracle-Gro Company. Hey Ashton, spring is the time most of us are out and about puttering in our yards. But what about this time of year, got any tips if we want to do some puttering now?

**Ashton:** Andrea, puttering is always good in the garden. Fall is a prime time to plant most trees and many perennials. Before you plant, make sure to thoroughly prepare your soil by loosening it and mixing in at least 2 to 3 inches of a good garden soil mix. Make sure the hole is extra wide, but not deeper than the plant grew in the container. Don't forget to water and mulch. Always add fresh compost or a good garden soil mix when you plant. Pay attention to spacing suggestions on the seed packs or plant tags, feed, water and stand back. If you put your ear to the ground, you will hear your grass saying "Feed me Andrea one more time this year to help build up my roots!" Here's some good news, you don't have to rake your leaves if you can mow them to dime size or smaller. That last fall feeding will help turn those small leaf pieces into compost right on your lawn. Ashton: Why yes Andrea, fall is the most common time to experience a mouse problem since those little guys are looking for shelter as the weather turns cooler. Here are some tips: Keep any food covered, including pet food, bird food, grass seed and bulbs. Sprinkle a little baby powder or flour along baseboards where mice might leave their tracks. Then you will know where to set one of those great new traps that don't pinch fingers, contain no poisons and are safe around children and pets. **Ashton:** Andrea, you make me laugh. Dead-heading simply means cutting or pinching off flowers on perennials, annuals or herbs which have bloomed and are starting to fade. This stops the seeds from forming, and allows the plant to spend its energy forming new blooms. Some folks worry that if they don't do this perfectly they might harm their plants. Don't worry, just pinch of faded flowers about a quarter inch above new buds. So the next time you hear The Grateful Dead on the radio, remember to go out and do some dead-heading. ## Tip #10

**Ashton:** How about adding some winter color? Replant your containers with plants that look good together and will survive any cold weather. Keep in mind the three shape rule: Tall plant in the middle, round and full plants around them and cascading plants down the sides. Think about a small evergreen, surrounded by winter pansies with trailing ivy. Or go with a dwarf holly with primrose and flowering ornamental kale.
